George Buehler, Whittier High School's massive tight end who led coach Vic Lopez' Cardinals to a final CIF playoff victory over Loyola 21-14 and in the doing snapped a Cub 35-game win streak, the longest ever in CIF grid play, was acclaimed "AAAA" Player of the Year by members of the Helms Foundation's All-Southern California Board of Athletics for the 1964 season. Selection of Buehler and three CIF "AAAA" Division teams was made at the 28th annual selection meeting of prep writers from throughout Southern Cal ifornia at Helms Hall in Los Angeles.

Buehler and two teammates -- quarterback Tim Walker and tackle Tom Seminoff -- were named on the CIF honor teams for 1964, as Whittier made it through a tough playoff schedule following a Pacific League tie with Alhambra. In the playoffs, Whittier defeated Pasadena (13-13 on first downs), Santa Ana Valley (14-7), Long Beach Poly (27-12) and the Loycla Cubs (21-14).

At 6-feet, two inches and 235 pounds, Buehler is among the strongest players to have performed in prep grid annals in the Southland. He was 1963 heavyweight wrestling champ in CIF ranks. He put the shot over 60 feet in track. He is extremely aggressive and from his linebacking position on defense has an amazing ability to diagnose plays. Coach Lopez informs that the Poly coaching staff -- the Cards

defeated them 27-12 -- feels that Buehler will be another Mike Ditka.

For having been named CIF "AAAA" Division Player of the Year for 1964, George Buehler, along with players named for first, second, and third team honors, will be honored at the 28th annual All-Southern California Board of Football Awards Program to be held at Helms Hall on Saturday morning, January 16, at 10:30 a.m. Players, coaches and dignitaries from the football scene will be in attendance.

Loyola's Mike Bergdahl, Buehler and Poly's Gene Washington

are the only repeaters from last year's team. Santa Ana Valley, Sunset League co-champs and first round victor over Ramona, 35-7, before bumping into Whittier(lost 14-7), placed three performers on the squad. Woody Deckard, Valley's fine QB and guard Dale Moeding were named to

the first team, while end Jim Champion was a third-team selection.

Long Beach Poly's fabulous due of Gene Washington and Al

Nichols accounted for over 3,000 yards in total offense for the Jackrabbits in 1964. Washington (706 rush and 887 pass) and Nichols (1596 rush and eclipsing Willie Brown's marks) managed 3,189 yards between them.

Twenty-six CIF "AAAA" Division schools are represented on the 1964 all-star teams. All players selected are seniors. Whittier coach Vic Lopez will receive a special silver tumbler award recognizing him for his coaching efforts in 1964.

erry Newlin who helped St. Francis to the CIF "AAA" Division title in 1964 was proclaimed Player of the Year in "AAA-AA" grid play as members of Helms All-Southern California Board of Football met at Helms Hall to make their annual football team selections. The Helms Board, following a pattern set last year, named four "small-school" teams, two in "AAA-AA" and two in "A-Small School" categories.

Steve Price and Brian Kilpatrick, who led Coachella and Rim of the World to "A" and "Small-School" CIF titles respectively, were accorded "Co-Player of the Year" honors for their respective division.

Newlin, who was named the top offensive back in Santa Fe League play was one of three St. Francis performers to be named to the 1964 first team. Teammates Dennis Flagg (QB) and center George Contreras were the others honored. The Knights, defending "AAA" champs whipped Garden Grove (34-32), Pomona Catholic (21-14), Santa Maria (20-12) and Claremont (14-0) in the finals.

Fullback Steve Price of Coachella, who gained 1,295 yards in total offense this year and 1,400 last, led his Arab teammates to the "A" Division crown with wins over Hemet (25-14), Laguna (20-19) and Mission of San Luis Obispo (28-6) in the finals.

Rim of the World's Brian Kilpatrick, one of two repeaters on the "A-Small School" Team, accounted for 1,605 in total offense, 1,394 of it passing. Brian threw for 16 TDs, completing 79 of 142 throws.

Kilpatrick directed Rim of the World to the Arrowhead League crown in 1964 and wins over Mountain Empire (48-12), Needles (47-21) and Valley Christian (13-7) in the finals. Guard Bob Steele of Rim was named to the all-star second team.

Thousand Oaks, "AA" finalist losing to San Marino 21-13, placed three players on the "AAA-AA" teams along with St. Francis. Halfbacks Ron Romans and Jim Russell were first-team picks, while tackle John Hammond was named to the second team. "AA" champion San Marino placed only end John Kinard on the first team.

teve Sogge, perhaps the finest athlete in Gardena High School history and the first and only City Player of the Year the Mohicans have had since the illustrious Don Bahrman cavorted on the grid back in 1948, was acclaimed a unanimous choice as 1964 Los Angeles City Football Player of the Year, as members of the Helms Hall prep board met at Helms Hall to make their annual high school gridiron selections.

Sogge led his Gardena team to the Los Angeles City title this past season with wins over Van Nuys (50-14), Reseda (35-14) and Los Angeles' Romans in the finale (12-12). In the City finals, the winner was decided on a special "formula" having to do with penetration of the opponent's 20 yard line and first downs made within the 20. Termed the "Costello" system, it was used for the first time in 1964.

The remarkable Steve Sogge, who graduates in February and is

The remarkable Steve Sogge, who graduates in February and is reportedly headed for USC, had as great a season as any City performer has ever experienced in 1964. In five league and three playoff game performances, Sogge completed 141 of 227 passes for 2,631 yards and 22 touchdowns, the latter a new City record. Steve added 10 TDs from scrimmage and 20 points in conversion efforts, to account for 212 points during the full season.

The Mohicans were the highest scoring team in the City for the past season, scoring 219 points in five games (44-point average) and added 97 in the playoffs for an eight-game scoring binge of 316 and a phenomenal 40-point average. In two games in 1964, Sogge threw for five TDs. Against Westchester in a practice game, Steve completed 23 of 34 passes for 351 yards and five TDs; against Van Nuys in the first City playoff game he completed nine of 18 for 256 yards and five TDs. Steve matched his greatest pass-yardage output against Reseda in the second playoff round, when he hit 14 of 21 for 351 yards and three TDs.

For having been named the Los Angeles City Player of the Year for 1964, Steve Sogge will be honored at the 28th annual All-Southern California Board of Football Awards Program to be held at Helms Hall on Saturday morning, January 16th at 10:30 a.m. All players chosen for Los Angeles City Team honors will be invited to be on hand to receive their scroll awards and to see Sogge receive a special Helms medallion as the City's top performer. His coach Stan Smith also will be honored.

Twenty City high schools find themselves represented on this year's All-Los Angeles City Team. Gardena's high-flying Mohicans landed three players on the first team as end John Paavola and guard Jeff Lancaster joined player of the year Sogge. Runner-up Los Angeles is represented by two players, guard Hal Griffin and junior back Charles Moch.

Al Proctor, center from Fremont, and Steve Sogge find themselves on the first team for the second year. Van Nuys' Rick Purdy moved up from last season's second team, while Gardena's Jim Lewis was again placed on the second squad. Birmingham's Craig Schusterick was a third team selection for a second year.

Gil Rozadilla, coach of Southern League champion Manual Arts, calls his ace tackle Willard Scott, "Outstanding in all phases of the Game", while opposing Southern League mentor Jim Pendleton of L.A. Los Angeles mathematically tied Manual in league play, 4-1, and placed five players on the first team, with three on the second.

Showing the league's strength, Manual and Los Angeles met in the semi-final playoff round, with the Romans winning, 14-7. L.A. had defeated Eagle Rock 40-13 in the first playoff round, while Manual had disposed of Roosevelt, 40-20.
